
Bi-Monthly Report to the Residents of Glendora



Village Beautification Project Completed

Over the last few weeks, the City of Glendora working with the Business Improvement District Board has undertaken a beautification project involving the street frontage along Glendora Avenue. In years past the informal agreement had the city providing some of the improvement like pots for plants and trimming trees and the businesses doing the tree wells and maintaining the pots. As businesses moved and the economic times became more difficult the effort fell into disrepair.



As a result of a collaborative effort between the BID and the Community Services Department work began to provide a more uniform look in maintaining the streetscape along Glendora Avenue. To help design and decide plant selection for the area, representatives went to visit streetscape in Victoria Gardens and conducted research via the web to get ideas on how the area could be beautified and done in a "green" view.

Community Services Director La Shawn Butler indicated that we wanted to select plant pallet that brought color, easy to maintain and drought tolerant. The effort also had to take into consideration that there is a heavy pedestrian presence in the Village. 'As a result, we needed to have sturdy and hearty vegetation that could withstand the impact of walkers and other activity along the sidewalks," said Butler.

Glendora Village got a landscape facelift in September when 11 Azusa Pacific student volunteers helped clean out planters and tree wells.

Village BID merchant-members Annette Nemeth (Glendora Interiors), Jana Jones (Ken Turner Real Estate and Martha's Candy), Jerry and Laurie Nicholas (Glendora Floor Store) worked non-stop for four hours with the students to fill 50-plus trash bags of debris.

City of Glendora workers assisted with new brooms, shovels, rakes, trash bags, trash cans, clippers, gloves, large snow-shovel size pans, and two large commercial trash dumpsters.

The City planted drought-tolerant plants such as iceberg roses, society garlic, Golden Euonymus, deep purple flax and others in the planters and tree wells.

The effort is being supported by the BID with financial assistance to help maintain the improvements. This will offset the reduction of individual businesses having to take time or hire their individual gardeners to keep up the streetscape in front of their business. The funds being used are from self-imposed assessments the businesses voted for back in 2009 when they formed the District.

The City of Glendora's Community Services Department is planning the renovation of South Hills Park. The park is adjacent to the beautiful South Hills Wilderness Area and trails system.

Glendora Receives Distinguished Budget Award from GFOA

The Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) presented the City of Glendora with the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for the 2012-2013 Budget. According to GFOA officials, the award represents a significant achievement in that it reflects the commitment of the governing body and staff to meeting the highest principles of governmental budgeting.

City officials recognized the outstanding effort of Mrs. Lettie deDios, Assistant Finance Director as the primary individual with putting the document together and working with departments to coordinate their effort. This year's effort was one of the most difficult as a result of the State's decision to eliminate redevelopment agencies throughout the state. Glendora lost over a \$1 million and used a community outreach effort to reach consensus on the budget reductions needed to balance the new spending plan.

GFOA is a nonprofit professional association serving approximately 17,400 government finance professionals throughout North America. The Distinguished Budget Presentation Award Program is the only national awards program in governmental budgeting.

\$74,780 Granted to the City for Tree Replacement Project

Almost everyone who lives in Glendora remembers the windstorm that occurred on November 30, 2011. The damage was extensive and evident. The city lost over one hundred trees to the wind storm, and the City Manager issued a "Declaration of Existence of a Local Emergency" due to the storm. Although the storm passed, many citizens were left without power and many trees were left knocked over and destroyed. The impact was tremendous, but on February 1, 2012, Michael D. Antonovich, Supervisor of the 5th district, announced a \$2,500,000 grant, to assist cities in the San Gabriel Valley in their efforts to replace destroyed trees, giving the City of Glendora a glimmer of hope.

It was then that the Community Services division took action. Project planning began, initiating the first steps to acquire the grant. On September 18, 2012, the City of Glendora was officially granted a total of \$74,780.00 to replace the damage the storm caused. A total of 109 trees will be planted throughout the city's parks and parkways. The Tree replacement project will be managed by the Community Services Department. They are responsible for the planning and design of the project, and with their experienced staff, will now execute the planning to complete the project.

It should not go unnoticed that the Community Services Department will acquire help to complete the project. The reliable and trusting students of Azusa Pacific University will contribute to the tree planting, along with our very own parks division staff and Youth to Work group. With the help of the Grant funds, the City of Glendora can now replace the fallen trees that helped make our community distinguished.

Youth Basketball seeking Coaches

Glendora Youth Basketball is seeking coaches for the upcoming 2012-2013 season. Our Youth Basketball program relies on volunteer basketball coaches to teach young participants basketball skills, teamwork, sportsmanship, and a love of the game. Over 500 youth participate in our basketball program. Coaches are needed for teams in the following age groups: 3rd & 4th grade – boys, 5th & 6th – boys, 7th & 8th – boys, 3rd-5th grade girls and 6th-8th grade girls. Teams practice on a designated weekday evening for an hour, and games are on Saturdays. The season runs January 5, 2013 through February 23, 2013. Coaches are required to be fingerprinted through the City prior to coaching. Detectives Crack Auto Burglary Ring

A verbal dispute between three males escalated into an assault when a homeless man was shot with a pellet gun while he was in South Hills Park in Glendora. This incident led to the arrests of three men in a series of automobile burglaries throughout Glendora and surrounding communities. On October 26th, a 41 year-old man was shot with a pellet gun causing a superficial wound to his back. The victim sought treatment for his injuries at Foothill Presbyterian Hospital and authorities were called.

During the investigation, Glendora Police Detectives identified 27 year old Jeremiah Weiden, of Covina as a suspect in the assault. On November 2nd a search warrant was served at his residence where investigators recovered pellet guns, ammunition, and property stolen from a recent vehicle burglary in Glendora.

Weiden was arrested and additional evidence was located linking him and two other males to a series of vehicle burglaries throughout Glendora and surrounding cities. The suspects used pellet guns to shoot out vehicle windows and steal property from the vehicles.

On November 3rd, a Glendora Patrol Officer stopped a vehicle in the 500 block of W. Baseline in Glendora that matched the description of the vehicle seen in the series of pellet gun window smash burglaries. The driver, 26 year-old Timothy Ingles of Glendora, was arrested after finding a pellet gun, along with property taken in recent vehicle burglaries with the same M/O from thefts in Glendora, Covina and Azusa.

On November 7th, Glendora Detectives served a search warrant for the third suspect, identified as 36 yearold James Graffius of Covina at his residence in the 1900 block of E. Tudor in Covina. Graffius was arrested without incident. Detectives recovered numerous pellet guns at his residence, as well as stolen property and other evidence linking him to the series of vehicle burglaries.

Weiden and Ingles are being held in custody with bail set at \$125,000 and \$195,000 respectively, with an appearance date at Citrus Court in West Covina set for November 29th. Charges are pending against Graffius.

Police Chief Rob Castro praised the investigators for their diligent work and skills to break the case that started from an assault on a homeless individual to solving a string of burglaries that had plagued the region.

Avoid Being a Victim of Crime ... Use Common Sense

With the holidays approaching, the Glendora Police Department would like to remind residents they are the best tool against becoming a victim of a crime. According to national crime studies, we make it too easy for criminals to take advantage of our situations and thus we become another victim to "crimes of Opportunity". According to Glendora Police Chief Rob Castro, "criminals look for the easiest victim in most cases: The purse left on the seat of the car, a person running into the store while leaving the car running; leaving tools in the back of pickup trucks or the leaving the wonderful gifts in plain view on the seat."



Police Department officials urge holiday shoppers to have a safer and more pleasant holiday by taking the following steps:

- Never leave your purse, wallet or cell phone where people can see it. If you need to leave them in your car, put them in the trunk before you reach your destination.
- Never leave shopping bags or packages in plain sight. If they cannot fit under the seat, then place them in the trunk.
- Never leave the keys in the car and certainly never leave the car running while you just run in for a quick minute
- Try not to shop alone, especially at night if at all possible. If you do, park underneath bright lighting.
- For women, try to keep your purse between yourself and a building, as keeping it on the side closest to the land of traffic makes for an ideal opportunity for robbers to quickly grab your purse, hop in a car and speed away.
- If someone approaches you about cashing a check or winning ticket, but they cannot cash it themselves for any reason, don't fall for it. It's a scam!
- Don't give money to panhandlers. It is more likely than not to go to illegitimate activities than for food or a place to sleep. We encourage you to give to established charities or churches with proven records of helping those less fortunate.

Chief Castro added that they remind folks every year about how they can avoid becoming a victim, yet when we get busy and lose our focus on simple steps like this, you're going to most likely become a victim at some time.

Small Business Survey Gives Glendora Something to Crow About

In late October, the Glendora City Council was presented with the results from a survey of small business operators within the City. The survey indicated that over 75% of the respondents felt Glendora to be a good to excellent place to conduct their business. This was the first known survey of the business community to be conducted. It comes just a year after the City conducted a survey of residents to solicit their views about the City overall and its services.

City Manager Chris Jeffers commented that the two surveys showed that both residents and business operators find the community to be an excellent place to live, work and play. Staff has placed the survey results on the City's website for the public to review.

The small business survey found that respondents felt their business operations would either remain about the same or increase over the next two years. This was a positive turnaround from what respondents indicated the previous two years had been. As a result, 24% of respondents indicated that they would likely be expanding their employee base and more than 90% said that they would not need to lay off any employees.

One of the unique questions posed in the survey was an attempt to try to obtain a fix on who makes up our small business community and why? Respondents indicated that about 26% actually live within the City and thus why their business is also located here. Another significant factor in locating in Glendora was the proximity to the freeways, with the 210 and 57 bordering the city.

The survey was undertaken by Valerie Escalante, Economic Development Specialist, who designed the survey and distributed the survey. "She actually hand delivered over 200 to small businesses in our target areas so that she was able to personalize the importance of their views and introduce herself as their ombudsman," said Chris Jeffers.

Hurricane Sandy Reminds us to be Prepared

The East Coast has been battered by Hurricane Sandy reminding us of the need to be prepared for whatever natural disaster may befall our community. We have seen residents and businesses without power for weeks after the event, thousands of displaced homeowners will have to wait months to move from temporary housing into more long-term housing opportunities, businesses boarded up for months as they await to rebuild and critical municipal infrastructure destroyed that will take months to rebuild and the impact that has upon everyday living.

"Our hearts and prayers go out to our fellow Americans that are victims of Hurricane Sandy. This is a reminder to us individually and collectively that we need to be prepared to handle a similar devastation which might follow an earthquake, windstorms or wildfires," said City Manager Chris Jeffers.

The reality of handling such a major event is the reason primary public safety officials recommend every household has an emergency supply kit prepared and stored in a place that can be easily accessed. Kits can be bought in stores or through the internet. You can also make your own kit and store it in a box or even an unused trash can. If you are planning to put your own kit together, you should have the following items:

- Radio that relies on batteries
- Extra batteries for the radio and flashlight
- Can goods of food, and manual can opener. 3 cans per person per day. (3 day supply)
- Extra clothes like underwear; pants, jackets, t-shirst and tennis shoes
- List of important phone numbers to call so that people know you are alright
- Flashlight
- 1 gallon of water per person/per day (3 day supply)
- Medications
- First Aid Kit

Police Chief Rob Castro emphasizes that being prepared and planning ahead is critical due to initial responders being overwhelmed with critical response needs. Events like a hurricane will over tax government and non-profit responders for days in some cases. Glendora has only 52 police officers and some of them may be unable to make it into work for hours due to damage to their own homes or freeways.


